This month, we will celebrate World Polio Day (October 24) and I hope that your clubs are planning special events and looking at how you can continue to support Rotary's efforts to eradicate polio around the world.

During the recent Zone 33 and 34 summit in Jacksonville, I was able to attend a very special breakfast with Past RI President Stephanie Urchick and several other governors for agreeing to donate 20% of our district's designated funds to Polio eradication. Our contribution of over \$57,000 will make a huge impact in our battle against polio. I got several photos and a signed invitation from Past RI President Stephanie.

I was also able to take several photos with the End Polio Now torch and participate in a "Zero K" event to help eradicate polio. This event was extremely well attended and fun. All "runners" received a photo crossing the finish line, a donut, a race number and t-shirt and of course, loads of fun and camaraderie. This is a great idea to help celebrate World Polio Day on Oct 24!

Rotary International and the Gates Foundation recently renewed their commitment to eradicating polio and protecting children everywhere from this paralyzing disease. Rotary will continue to raise \$50 million per year, and each dollar will be matched with US\$2 from the Gates Foundation. Over the next three years, this will dedicate up to US\$450 million to support the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Take a look at this video from Bill Gates.

The need for Rotary and our members to financially support these efforts is greater than ever. So take time to think what you can do to support End Polio Now this World Polio Day.

We need your support to identify and nominate qualified candidates through an official club resolution. If you are an interested Rotarian, please let your club leaders know of your interest. Follow the links to the certified club resolution form and Article 16 of the Rotary Manual of Procedure, detailing the District Governor's role and responsibilities.

Please ensure any candidate your club nominates meets the following qualifications:

Oualifications for a Governor-Nominee

At the time of selection, unless excused by the Rotary International Board, the nominee must:

- Be a member in good standing of a functioning club in District 6900
- Have served as club president for a full term or as charter president for at least six months
- Demonstrate willingness, commitment, and ability to fulfill the duties and responsibilities outlined in section 16.030
- Show knowledge of the qualifications, duties, and responsibilities of a governor as prescribed in the bylaws
- Submit a statement to Rotary International confirming they understand these qualifications, duties, and responsibilities, are qualified for the office, and are willing and able to faithfully perform them.

Once your club has nominated a candidate, please send the club resolution and a brief "Rotary Resume" to District Executive Secretary, Mandy Timmons (d6900secretary2526@gmail.com), with a cc to me (stiv1994@gmail.com), by **Friday, October 24, 2025**. The district nominating committee, chaired by me and consisting of our governor line and past district governors, will interview candidates on **Saturday, November 1, 2025**.

Congratulations to Our 2025-26 Competitive Grant Winners!

Rotary District 6900 and The Rotary Foundation have awarded \$35,000 in grant funds for projects starting in the 2025–2026 Rotary year. The following clubs were selected to receive funding:

- Meriwether County Rotary Club Supporting K-12 students by providing access to everyday essential items needed for students and their families to eliminate Learning Barriers through the Meriwether County School System Wraparound Care Center
- North Fulton Rotary Club Creating a Peace Garden with two peace poles with grand gardens at WellStar North Fulton Medical Center, offering quiet respites and peaceful spaces for patients and visitors
- Carrollton Rotary Club Providing three different therapeutic entertainment, music, art, and exercise events for the elderly community members in the Carrollton area
- **Roswell Rotary Club** Hosting a Family Farm Day to honor and support first responders, police officers, firefighters, and their families with meaningful activities, along with hands-on activities such as building community-themed bird houses
- Peachtree City Rotary Club Building a "Melody Meadow" outdoor sensory space at Camp Southern Ground featuring outdoor musical instruments for music enrichment programs for kids and their families
- North Cobb Rotary Club Installing an integrated therapy platform system at McKenna Farms to enhance gross motor skills for individuals who are undergoing physical, occupational, and speech

therapy.

This program is part of The Rotary Foundation (TRF), which allocates funds for District Grants to clubs based on contributions made to the Rotary Annual Fund three years prior.

- Key elements of the grant application process include:
- Clearly outlining the problem or need.
- Explaining how the project will address or alleviate the issue.
- Detailing Rotarian involvement (required for all projects)
- Describing how the club will promote The Rotary Foundation.

Congratulations to all the winning clubs for their outstanding projects and commitment to service! We'll keep you posted on their progress.



The Foundation raised more than \$569 million this year! In addition, it surpassed the milestone goal of \$2 billion dollars for the Rotary Endowment. Those are incredible numbers that should be celebrated as they are something we all can be proud of being a part of. Without question, those are big dollars. Revisiting my friend's father's statement, I suppose we could stop the discussion right there and pat ourselves on the back. But we can't stop there, we're Rotarians and our motto really says it all as to what we are truly about. "Service Above Self." We repeat that phrase at every gathering. Not because it's just what we say, but rather because it always reminds us of **who we are** as Rotarians. Therefore, it's not the dollars that are important by themselves, that's just the start. What's more important is what we do with those dollars to transform the world and our communities into something better.

So, what did we DO with those dollars as a Foundation? The Rotary Foundation awarded 1,424 global grants, 468 district grants, and 74 disaster response grants. What else was accomplished? We renewed our agreement with the Gates Foundation, which is a total recommitment to finishing the fight to end Polio. By the way, are you ready for World Polio Day on October 24? Make sure your club is ready to put on its event and be sure to register your event.

Additionally, as Rotarians, we are fully committed to bringing peace to the world as The Foundation awarded the prestigious "Programs of Scale" grant to "The Pathways to Peace and Prosperity in

Colombia."

So, let's revisit that statement of my friend's father. Yes, money is important, but as Rotarians we know it's NOT the dollars themselves, it's what we do with them that makes them important. We should be very pleased with what we did last year, now let's make this year even better. For as I always like to say, "Let's continue to work together to make our Foundation stronger as it reaches greater heights."



Why October 24?

World Polio Day was established by **Rotary International** to honor **Dr. Jonas Salk**, who developed the first successful polio vaccine in 1955. It's a day to raise global awareness about **polio**, a crippling and potentially deadly disease, and to recognize the incredible progress made toward its eradication.

A Global Movement

Since the launch of the **Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI)** in 1988, polio cases have dropped by **99%**, and over **20 million people** have been spared from paralysis thanks to vaccination efforts. But the fight isn't over - polio remains endemic in a few countries, and continued support is critical to:

- Maintain high immunization coverage
- Prevent resurgence in polio-free areas
- Achieve full eradication—making polio the second human disease ever eliminated (after smallpox)

This Year's Challenge: Raise \$1,500 per Club for PolioPlus! We're calling on every club to step up and help us reach this goal. Let's make a powerful impact together!

GRSP Update

GRSP Salutes Partnerships in Norway and Denmark

Georgia Rotary Student Program (GRSP) Executive Director Katheryne Fields and District 6910 Chair and Foundation Director Cheryl Huffman traveled to Scandinavia in early September to honor the 79-year partnership between GRSP and Norwegian Rotarians. At the invitation of District Governor Sean Armana, who also serves as GRSP Coordinator for Norway, the pair spoke at District 2260's conference in Oslo while also visiting alumni and partner institutions in Denmark and Norway.

"Our time in Norway was marked by exceptional hospitality," Fields said. "It was such an honor to share the GRSP story and celebrate our longstanding partnership. I returned energized and deeply grateful for the opportunity to collaborate with Rotarians around the world. Meeting our alumni abroad and walking the campuses of our summer programs gave me valuable insight to bring back to our Georgia scholars."

The tour began in Aarhus, Denmark, where area Rotarians hosted Fields and Huffman at Aarhus University, which was a new affiliation for two Georgia college students this summer. As guests of PDG Thomas Korsgaard, father of GRSP alumna Nana Rasmussen (Class of 2022-23), they presented to the Rotary Impact Group. Danish coordinator Birgitte Illum (Class of 1989-90) welcomed nearly a dozen alumni into her home for fellowship and Denmark's famous open-face "shooting star" sandwiches. Alumni reflected on lifelong friendships with classmates and host families, emphasizing how GRSP continues to shape their lives. In Copenhagen, the group enjoyed a community dinner with alumni and explored the capital with former scholars as guides.

The program's roots in Norway run deep. GRSP was founded in 1946 by Will Watt, with Norwegian student Paul Dietrichson among the first four scholars. In 1956, King Haakon VII awarded Watt the St. Olaf Citizen of Honor medal for his efforts to build goodwill. Since then, GRSP has welcomed 312 students from Norway and 322 from Denmark.

"Both cultures often describe themselves as not naturally social, yet we were met with remarkable warmth everywhere we went," Huffman shared. "Regardless of whether our alumni had been home one year or thirty, their gratitude for GRSP was consistent. Many told us their careers were shaped by their time in Georgia."

The final leg of the trip took them to Oslo, where highlights included a visit to Oslo University on its 214th anniversary, a meaningful tour of the Nobel Peace Center, and time exploring museums, canal rides, botanical and sculpture gardens, fjords, and consuming coffee along with shrimp sandwiches on freshbaked bread. Speaking at the District 2260 Conference served as the capstone—an opportunity to celebrate GRSP's history, encourage membership growth, and reaffirm the program's mission of promoting peace through understanding.

Update from the Camino - "The Way" to Fight Polio

Hola from Logrono Spain, where this **East Cobb Rotarian** is taking a much needed rest day after a little over a week walking the Camino de Santiago. So far I have walked more than 160km (over 100 miles). The first stages, up and over the Pyrenees, were challenging to say the least. The downhill sections are particularly hard on the knees, especially with the additional weight of a full backpack.

My physical training for the Camino started in earnest last December after hip replacement surgery, working my way from using a walker, then struggling to the end of the street with a cane, and eventually on to Kennesaw Mountain and Blood Mountain in north Georgia, gradually adding weight to the backpack and swapping the cane for hiking poles. But I've learned that nothing really prepares you for walking the Camino like walking the Camino.

The support from our Rotary family though my "Pilgimage Against Polio" fundraiser (https://raise.rotary.org/Brad-Groff/challenge) has definitely helped to keep my spirits up and motivate me to keep putting one foot in front of the other. A huge thank you to everyone who has contributed. Editor's Note: Brad Groff has raised just over \$10,000 so far for polio eradication.

Laws of Life

Rotarians and Teachers Kick Off 2025-26 Laws of Life Essay Contest









In late August, Rotarians, educators, and supporters from across Georgia gathered at the Emory Conference Center in Atlanta—and online—for the annual Teacher & Rotarian Workshop Luncheon. The event launched the 2025–26 Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest.

A character-building, values-based writing program that builds partnership between teachers, who guide students through the essay-writing process, and Rotary Clubs, which sponsor contests in their local schools and communities, reaches more than 33,000 students each year. Together, we give students an opportunity to reflect on the life lessons that shape who they are—and who they want to become.

Highlights of the luncheon included remarks from Adam Throne, English teacher at North Springs High School a partner school of the Rotary Club of Sandy Springs. Adam shared how the contest both aligns with Georgia's ELA standards and empowers students to discover their voice. Guests were also moved by Alphonsa Joby, last year's state winner from Denmark High School, who read her award-winning essay and reminded attendees of the contest's lasting impact.

Selena Blankenship, Board Member and Rotarian from the Rotary Club of Classic City Athens, offered insights from her dual perspective as a Rotarian and retired educator. She emphasized that the contest not only supports Rotary's mission of service but also with teachers a powerful way to understand their students more deeply - building empathy, strengthening relationships, and creating classroom connections

that no other assignment provides.

Last year, 65 Rotary Clubs and 65 schools across Georgia participated. Now is the time for returning sponsors to recommit and reconnect with partner schools, and for new clubs to get involved. Rotary Clubs serve as sponsors and honor students for their work, and Rotarians serve as judges selecting the winning essays - ensuring student voices are heard and recognized.

All we are asking at this point is to decide if your club is going to sponsor students to attend RYLA and how many students that will be. Then you may use one of the following routes to send in your RSVP:



Roswell Shares Strategies for Launching Interact Clubs



Launching a new Interact Club is truly a celebration. Why? It can take years to find the right people in the right roles at the right time with the right vision and energy. consider leadership roles and attend RYLA. Although none of them were able to attend, they began to realize just how robust, impactful yet flexible Interact is as a program for the entire campus.


LAUNCH: Their first school-wide club meeting was held the week after Labor Day and hosted 95 students! Ferrara and Medley had taken the time to better understand the program and how to plug into it. They now have students engaged in the Roswell Youth Council (a collaboration between Roswell Rotary and the City of Roswell) as well as the upcoming Youth Day Parade! Both are service projects supported by Roswell Rotary Club. Although their participation with the RRC service projects is never required, we have found that it is a great way for the new Interact Clubs to feel immediately engaged while making decisions for the next semester.

This year, Roswell Rotary Club has 14 active clubs: five elementary, four middle, and five high schools. We are proud to support the next generation of service leaders through our thriving Interact Program. These clubs support and advise students across our community with service projects that are local, regional and international. Americus Rotarian Supports Peacebuilding



At the recent Rotary International Conference in Calgary, Americus Rotarian Laura McConatha had two opportunities to present on the peacebuilding work taking place in Americus, Georgia. A Rotary International/Institute for Economics and Peace Positive Peace Activator, Laura is both Service Chair and Peace Chair of the Americus Rotary Club. She had a three-hour kiosk presentation in the Peace Park on "Building Peace and Promoting Unity in rural Georgia: A Carter Legacy". In addition, she co-

presented with fellow Positive Peace Activators Tamara Larson and Patricia Shafer on "Positive Peacebuilding: Engaging Youth Through Rotary, Communities, Schools." Laura focused her talk on the Grace Camp initiative that took place this summer in Americus. Grace Camp was an idea born during a series of workshops co-facilitated by Laura late last year titled "Coming Together in Unity: Community Dialogue for Peace with Youth at the Center."

Using Rotary's 8 Pillars of Positive Peace, local high school students and community leaders came together to identify the root causes of violence and brainstorm potential solutions. During one session, a teen participant expressed concern that, despite the presence of many churches in the community, none had taken concrete action to show youth that they are seen and cared for. Inspired by his idea, a faith-based collaborative was formed to create a community-building safety net for youth through summer programming - resulting in the launch of Grace Camp. Along with the Americus Rotary Club, 10 area churches and 3 community organizations were actively involved in the rollout of Grace Camp this summer.

The work of the Americus Rotary Club's Peace Committee recently earned the club the distinction of being awarded Peacebuilder Club status by the Rotary Action Group for Peace. Next up for the club is a Unity in Community Festival, which will take place on Saturday, October 25 in Rylander Park, the site of the club's inaugural Peace Pole installation.














Celebrating Service and Excellence in Fayetteville

The modern shelter, triple the size of its predecessor, houses 430 cats and dogs, with twice that number in foster care, all searching for their fur-ever homes. Spacious housing, a full-service clinic, and dedicated

play yards make it a welcoming, adoption-friendly environment. Members even got a glimpse of a spay-and-neuter procedure in the OR—no scrubs were required!

LifeLine's results are impressive with 1,557 adoptions in August, across their three shelters. Buckhead Rotary is proud to support initiatives that improve the mental well-being of both people and animals. We look forward to several upcoming events to help LifeLine continue this life-changing work.
